

DFI UK COVID-19 Risk Assessment

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Review date: This document will be reviewed weekly by the RA team with changes updated as necessary and according to Government advice and business need

Following the outbreak of the COVID 19 Virus, and its subsequent classification as a worldwide pandemic, the UK Government have advised everyone to stay at home where possible, and only leave home for essential journeys. Employees of food manufacturers have been classified as essential workers.

At the start of the lockdown period, DFI UK staff were identified as either 'essential to site' or 'able to work from home', so that staff numbers on site could be reduced. Following the reduction in sales orders, a proportion of staff have been furloughed. This has dramatically reduced the number of staff on site.

As the lockdown measures are eased, DFI UK has a requirement for staff to gradually return to work.

This risk assessment considers the COVID 19 Virus risks to DFI UK employees, visitors and contractors, while working at site or working remotely, and while they travel to and from work.

This risk assessment is in addition to all other Health and Safety or Food Safety Risk Assessments that are used by DFI UK.

The symptoms of COVID-19 are usually mild, but some people can become very unwell, and in some cases could die.	High	* Suitable and sufficient rubbish bins provided in these areas with regular removal and disposal. * Janitorial staff wear disposable gloves when handling rubbish. * There are dedicated eating areas and kitchens on site to reduce food waste and contamination. * Additional cleaning in place by janitorial team * Drinking water is provided with enhanced cleaning measures of the tap mechanism. * Vending machines provided at Crewe, food is pre-prepared and wrapped.
